



It has 5 days in three successive years and 6 days in the leap year.

Gregorian Calendar equivalent:  
*September 6-10*



Its Egyptian name is pikouji n~a~bot – pikouji en-avot, meaning the little month.

In the Coptic “Egyptian” Calendar, the year is 365  $\frac{1}{4}$  days.

That is why for every four years of the calendar, there are three years of 365 days each followed by one year of 366 days.

The Coptic year has 12 months of exactly 30 days each, totaling 360 days. The remaining 5 or 6 days are called “The Little Month.”

In Arabic, some people call this month El-Nasii,, meaning “the forgotten days.” This is not accurate or appropriate, since the Egyptian name can only be translated “The Little Month.”

In the Pharaonic times, people celebrated these 5 or 6 days as feast days for their gods.
