Every youth dreams to grow closer to God and say proudly with Saint Paul the apostle: "it is no longer I who live, but Christ lives in me." (Galatians 2:20) As I think about the life of Saint Paul, the key to his successful spiritual life becomes clear. It was truly the power of the Holy Spirit in his life that guided him to live as Christ lived. The life of Saint Paul can be a great example for youth who are struggling in this world to maintain a good relationship with God. He was not born a saint but a regular human like us; however, through the guid-

where he remained for three years (Galatians 1:17-18). He wanted to get to know God better before he told others about Him. A great lesson for us to learn is that we need to know and experience the beauty of being God's children before we can tell others about Him. You cannot give to others something that you do not have yourself!

When St. Paul finally went to Jerusalem to start his service, he found himself rejected, "when Saul had come to Jerusalem, he tried to join the disciples; but they were all afraid of him, and did not believe that he was a disciple." (Acts 9:26) Despite feeling rejected, he did not stop serving or preaching the name of

over, the fact that millions of people submit to the guidance of St. Paul's words is in itself a testimony to the Holy Spirit taking hold of St. Paul's spirit and filling his mind with those words. Our lives are transformed the same way when we allow the Holy Spirit to work in us. Not only do our words become powerful, but our lives become a shining light to others as well.

St. Paul, guided by the Holy Spirit, started his first missionary journey from 45 to 51 AD. The apostle traveled throughout the island of Cyprus and also founded many Christian communities in the Asia Minor cities of Pisidian, Antioch, Iconium, Lystra, and Derbe. Through the power

was his custom, he would go and visit all the other churches and communities he had started. He had to make sure the foundation he set was strong before he started another one. The same goes for us in our spiritual life. We must first listen for and hear the voice of the Holy Spirit inside us. This is the foundation of our spiritual life that will strengthen us in our trials and temptations.

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ance of the Holy Spirit, he became a saint. So, brethren, let us take a small journey through the life of St. Paul and learn how we also can abide in Christ.

St. Paul started his life with a

mission to persecute and kill all Christians if they did not refrain from worshiping Christ. However, our Lord looked at St. Paul's heart and found a man willing to serve and obey Him. On the way to Damascus, God appeared to Saul and invited him to serve him and St. Paul accepted with joy. Many times we struggle trying to please God and wander along a wrong path. We get so caught up with an idea of how to please Him that we forget about Him. We fail to listen to His voice inside us, forgetting that He is only asking for our hearts.

St. Paul tells us that after his baptism the Holy Spirit directed him to go into Arabia. He spent time in the desert before returning to Damascus,

Christ. He was strengthened by the Holy Spirit and "he spoke boldly in the Name of the Lord Jesus." (Acts 9:29) You may not be an intellectual or well thought of in your family circle, you may even be despised by others for your faith, but remember that those who are rejected of men are often beloved of the Lord. Allow the Holy Spirit inside you to comfort and strengthen you like St. Paul did.

St. Paul started his mission talking about the Christ he knew. Led by the Holy Spirit, his words were powerful, penetrating the hearts of his audience. As Father Matthew the Poor commented, "Words in Saint Paul are sometimes like pointed spears which are very difficult to escape, because it is the Spirit who aims and hurls them. For the Word of God in St. Paul is sharpened by the Spirit of God. It pierces the dividing line between soul and spirit, penetrating even the marrow of one's bones. It exposes, lays bare and reproves sin - then binds up [the wounds]." Moreof the Holy Spirit, he carried out his second missionary journey from 51 to 54 AD. He initially visited the churches that he had founded in Asia Minor, and then he crossed over to Macedonia, where he founded congregations in Philippi, Thessalonica, and Berea. In 55 AD St. Paul left for Jerusalem, visiting Ephesus and Caeseria, and from Jerusalem he went to Antioch. After a short stay in Antioch, Saint Paul undertook his third missionary journey from 56 to 58 AD, initially visiting churches in Asia Minor that had founded on earlier trips, then stopping at Ephesus, where he preached daily for two years in the school of Tyrannus.

From the journeys of St. Paul we learn many great lessons. In particular, we as youth can learn perseverance. St. Paul was able to hear the voice of the Holy Spirit guiding him to where he needed to go. Also, as
