Prayer and Meditation for Repentance and Joyful Return to God

Opening Prayer: Heavenly Father, Most Merciful and Loving, I come before You with a contrite heart, seeking Your forgiveness and grace. As I embark on this journey of repentance, guide my spirit, O Lord, and let Your Word be a lamp unto my feet. In the name of Jesus Christ, I pray. Amen.

Scriptural Foundation: "Create in me a clean heart, O God, and renew a steadfast spirit within me." (Psalm 51:10 - NKJV)

"I will arise and go to my father, and will say to him, 'Father, I have sinned against heaven and before you." (Luke 15:18 - NKJV)

Meditation:

1. **Acknowledging the Straying Heart:** In the stillness of this moment, I acknowledge my transgressions, dear Lord. Like the prodigal son, I have wandered away from Your loving embrace. I bring before You the weight of my sins, laying them at the foot of the cross.
